The Nigerian Pavilion at the 60th International Art Exhibition of La Biennale di Venezia marked the second time the country has ever participated in the global art event.

The exhibition, "Nigeria Imaginary," was held in a historical palazzo in Dorsoduro, near the Gallerie dell'Accademia.

It featured an intergenerational group of nine Nigerian and Nigerian diasporic artists: Tunji Adeniyi-Jones, Ndidi Dike, Onyeka Igwe, Toyin Ojih Odutola, Abraham Oghobase, Yinka Shonibare, Fatimah Tuggar, and Precious Okoyomon.

His Excellency, the Governor of Edo State, Mr Godwin Obaseki, was the pavilion's commissioner on behalf of the Federal Ministry of Art, Culture and the Creative Economy with the forthcoming Museum of West African Art (MOWAA) Edo State, serving as its official organizer.

Aindrea Emelife, the Nigerian-British curator of contemporary and modern art at MOWAA, was the pavilion's curator. She proposed the list of artists and exhibition theme, which she said will provide "a way of looking forward to the future while also looking back—their modernity is very much rooted still in this embrace of tradition."

The concept of Nigeria Imaginary explores the role of both great moments in Nigeria's history—moments of optimism as well as the Nigeria that lives in our minds—a Nigeria that could be and is yet to be. Various forms of art are displayed, including painting, photography, drawing, installation, sculpture, AR, sound, and film.

Governor Godwin Obaseki said, "The exhibition is deeply aligned with the vision of the Edo State Government for encouraging socio-cultural and economic development through the promotion of art and tourism, and I have full confidence in the Museum of West African Art (MOWAA) to assist in organising a world-class exhibition."

The pavilion in Italy will be showcased from April 20 to November 24, 2024.

In 2025, the Rainforest Gallery, the new contemporary art space in the MOWAA Creative District, Edo State, will host an inaugural exhibition.

Some of the target sectors, such as tourism, agriculture, and information technology, are areas of mutual interest for the Edo State Government and the Hungarian Government.





THE BENIN MOAT A testament to Edo's Creativity and Innovation







Edo State is well-renowned for its rich artistic heritage and skills, which are well highlighted in the famous sculptures (Benin Bronzes), as well as its wooden carvings. But the bronzes and sculptures were not the only legacy passed down from the great Benin Kingdom, filled with skilled craftsmen and builders. The Benin Moat, also known as the Walls of Benin, was acknowledged by the Guinness Book of World Records in 1974 as one of the world's most significant man-made structures by length, second only to China's Great Wall. The construction began around 800 AD and was completed in the 14th century. It consisted of a combination of ramparts (earthen walls) and intricate moats (ditches) that encircled the city of Benin.

The primary purpose of the Benin Moat was defensive. It served as a fortification to protect the city of Benin from external including invasions neighbouring kingdoms and European colonizers. The moat was part of a sophisticated defensive system that included walls, gates, and strategic placement of settlements and military structures. The entire system was designed to slow down and deter invading forces, giving the defenders time to organize and mount a defense. The innermost ditch was the deepest and widest, making it a formidable barrier for any wouldbe attackers, and encircled the most vital areas like the royal palace and chiefs' residences.

The Benin Moat is of significant historical and cultural importance. It showcases the expertise of the people with earth (clay) and symbolizes the ancient Kingdom of Benin's military strength and organizational prowess.



Restored Heritage

UK Returns Asante Artefacts to Ghana After 150 Years

- In April 2024, the UK returned 32 gold and silver artefacts to Ghana after more than 150 years.
- Artefacts were taken during 19th-century conflicts between the British and Asante people.
- Returned items include a gold peace pipe, a sword of state, and gold badges worn by officials.
- Artefacts are part of Asante royal government symbolism, believed to hold the spirits of former kings.
- The returned items are on a long-term loan to Ghana from the Victoria & Albert Museum (V&A) and the British Museum.
- On May 1 2024, the Asante King displayed the artefacts for the first time at Manhyia Palace Museum in Kumasi to mark the Asante King's silver jubilee.
