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PROTECT YOUR SKIN WITH NICERIAN BEAUTY SECRETS

Nigerian beauty secrets have been passed down through generations, offering natural and effective ways to enhance the skin. Let's explore some of the natural beauty staples you can incorporate into your skincare routine.

1. Camwood Polish or Powder

Camwood is a Baphia nitida plant species mostly found in West and Central Africa. It is also known as barwood and African sandalwood. This tree is often planted in Osun State, Nigeria; that is why Yoruba called it "osun." The reddish powder, derived from the heartwood of the camwood tree, has been used as skin care for centuries in Nigeria, particularly by the Yoruba tribe. Camwood is known for its skin-enhancing properties as it is highly rich in minerals, vitamins, and antibiotics, which help in treating sunburn, even skin tone, reduce blemishes, and promote a healthy glow.

One of the famous skin soaps made from Camwood is **Black Soap (Dudu Osun)**.

2. Black soap, fondly called Dudu Osun by Yoruba's, is created from medicinal camwood alongside other plant-based ingredients like shea butter, aloe vera, palm





kernel oil, cocoa pod ash, palm bunch ash, and lime. The soup, known for its gentle cleansing properties, can be applied to the hair, scalp, and skin. It's excellent for deep cleansing, exfoliation, and treating acne. Camwood, a primary ingredient, contributes to its exfoliating effects.

3. Shea Butter

Shea butter is extracted from shea trees, mostly grown in the savannah regions of West and East Africa. Shea butter is a rich natural moisturiser obtained from the nuts of the shea tree, which is grown in about 21 states in Nigeria, but only four states (Niger, Kebbi, Oyo, and Kwara) are largely engaged in its production. This oily substance has a lot of vitamins and fatty acids that nourish and hydrate the skin. Regular use of shea butter can improve skin elasticity, fade scars, and protect against environmental damage.



4. Charcoal:

Activated charcoal is charcoal that has been processed and cleaned up. Charcoal, which literally means turn to coal, is a blackish substance mainly made of carbon, derived from wood and bone burned. Coal is largely produced in some parts of Nigeria, including Enugu, Benue, Kogi, and Plateau states. Activated charcoal is more commonly used in medicine than charcoal due to its cleanliness. Its detoxifying properties are used for skincare, as it absorbs impurities, excess oil, and toxins from the skin, leaving it fresh and rejuvenated. You can find charcoal-based skincare products or create your own masks using activated charcoal powder.



5. Native Chalk or Calabar Chalk

While controversial due to its lead content, some Nigerian women use native chalk (also called "nzu" or "calabar chalk") for skincare, mostly in the eastern and southern parts of Nigeria. It is called nzu in Igbo, orhua in Edo, and efun in Yoruba. Its mineral elements (such as iron, calcium, aluminium, silicon, bicarbonate, and sulphate) improve skin texture, reduce oiliness, and provide a natural glow to the skin. However, caution is necessary, and alternatives like kaolin clay are safer.



6. Turmeric

Turmeric, known as "ata ile" in Yoruba, is a vibrant yellow spice with powerful anti-inflammatory and antioxidant properties, highly cultivated in 19 Nigerian states. It can brighten the complexion, fade dark spots, soothe irritated skin, treat burns, and relieve sunburn pain. Turmeric can help with wound healing, effective for acne, eczema, psoriasis, and rosacea. Mix turmeric with honey or yoghurt for a nourishing face mask.

7. Honey

Honey is loaded with vitamins, antioxidants, and amino acids, which promote youthful skin. Organic acids in honey (like gluconic acid) accelerate the shedding of dead skin cells. Honey's antibacterial properties reduce pimples, especially red ones. Remember to do a patch test before using honey extensively, especially if you have sensitive skin.



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



Why Bats Fly at Night






STAVINC HYDRATED AND HEALTHY IN THE HEAT AND HUMIDITY


curated a list of soups with little or no fresh peppers you can try out. They are economical, healthy, and delightful.


Pepper Soup: Don't let the name fool you! Nigerian Pepper Soup can be made with just 2-3 pieces of Scotch bonnet peppers (rodo), allowing other aromatic spices to take the spotlight. This broth features ingredients like crayfish, ginger, and garlic, as well as a mix of traditional spices such as uda seeds and calabash nutmeg. It can be garnished with proteins such as fish, goat meat, or chicken, and it's perfect with a side of rice.





Efo Riro/Vegetable Soup: Efo Riro is a colourful and nutritious vegetable soup that can be prepared with minimal peppers. The star ingredients are green leafy vegetables like spinach or fluted pumpkin leaves (ugu), combined with onions, locust beans (iru), and palm oil for a rich, savory base. Protein options like dried fish or meat serve as flavor enhancers. This soup is a fantastic way to enjoy a flavorful dish without relying heavily on peppers and tomatoes. Plus, it can be enjoyed with rice.





Ingredients

Palm fruit Beletete Rohojie Oburunbebe **Banga Soup:** Banga soup is a delicious palm nut-based soup that requires no fresh peppers. The primary ingredient is palm fruit extract, which gives the soup its rich, velvety texture and deep flavor. Seasoned with traditional spices like beletete, rohojie, and oburunbebe stick, banga soup is often cooked with fish, meat, or seafood. Its unique taste and creamy consistency make it a perfect companion to rice, providing a luxurious meal without the high cost.

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Edikaikong: Edikaikong is a nutritious and flavorful soup from the Efik and Ibibio people of Nigeria, made with a variety of leafy greens such as waterleaf and ugu. This soup can be prepared with little or no fresh peppers, focusing instead on rich flavours from ingredients like crayfish, onions, and palm oil. It typically includes a variety of proteins like goat meat, beef, or fish, making it a hearty and satisfying dish. Apart from that, the soup is packed with nutrients to keep the body alive.

Egusi Soup: Egusi soup is also a great option, made with ground melon seeds (egusi) as its primary ingredient. This soup can be prepared with little or no fresh peppers, depending on your preference. Key ingredients include onions, crayfish, and leafy greens such as spinach or ugu necessary to do the magic. Palm oil adds color and richness, while various proteins such as goat meat, beef, or fish enhance the heartiness of the dish. Egusi soup is a satisfying and economical option that pairs perfectly with rice.

Groundnut/peanut Soup: Groundnut/Peanut Soup is a rich dish made from blended roasted peanuts, which provides a nutty flavor and thick consistency. No fresh peppers are required, giving way for other affordable spices like calabash nutmeg, uziza seeds, and dry peppers to enhance the aromatic profile of this delicacy, while palm oil adds vibrant color. You can garnish this soup with any protein of your choice and finish it with vegetables, preferably properly washed bitterleaf. Enjoy it with rice or savor it on its own. 



AFRICAS HICH FASHION BETS ON CLOBAL RETAIL PRESENCE

THE SCENE

When Kenya's Vivo Fashion opened its first US store in Atlanta in the third week of May it was the latest step in a push by African brands to expand the "high fashion" value chain on the global stage.

Vivo, co-founded by Wandia Gichuru and Anne-Marie Burugu, already has 26 stores in Kenya, Uganda, and Rwanda. For its launch at Atlantic Station in Atlanta, it brought along Kenya-made brands, including Anjiru, Ikwetta, and Soko.

It follows in the footsteps of brands like Lagos-based menswear specialists Deji & Kola,, which opened its first UK store in March following the opening of a store in Canada last year. South African knitwear brand MaXhosa also revealed plans to open a New York retail base in February as it launched a six-month pop-up store in the city.

An African fashion industry report by Unesco from last October noted that developing retail distribution with e-commerce and physical stores would be essential for boosting the high fashion sector. In 2022, this sector will account for around a fifth of Africa's \$6 billion luxury goods market. Overall demand for African haute couture will increase by 42% over the next decade.

"Many high fashion designers operate from small outlets or studios in the suburbs of major cities in Africa, but the lack of organized retail spaces impacts brands' visibility and reach in a competitive market," wrote the report's authors.

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Kenya State House

Kate Mayeye, CEO of Nairobi-based African Fabrics and Design, told Semafor Africa that the global rise of fast fashion—where massmarket retailers flood the market with inexpensive clothing to keep up with trends had helped raise demand for unique, highquality pieces, which African fashion houses are happy to provide.

> "International buyers are looking for quality, authenticity, and uniqueness," she explained. Mayeye also noted that Africans in the diaspora were helping create a buzz around fashion from the continent, much like they aided the rise in global popularity of African music genres, including Afrobeats and Amapiano.

> The Unesco report values African fashion exports at \$15.5 billion per year and calls for increased investment and improved policymaking to support the industry. It highlights its potential to strengthen economies.

Vivo's Atlanta store was unveiled by Kenya's President William Ruto during his ongoing state visit to the US. "This is not just a win for Vivo, but for Kenya and Africa as a whole. It showcases the global potential of African brands and the entrepreneurial spirit that drives our continent forward," he said.

THE VIEW FROM NIGERIA

Nigerian fashion designers and brands are increasingly earning international acclaim with their designs taking center stage at fashion events worldwide - including at the Brooklyn Museum's "Africa Fashion" exhibition, where popular Lagos concept store Alara opened a pop-up shop in 2023.

"Currently, the global fashion community is looking to the African continent for more than inspiration," Ernestine White-Mifetu, the Sills Foundation curator of African art at the Brooklyn Museum, told the New York Times in April. "The fashion world at large is finally ready to pay attention."

















Tobi Amusan

Nigerian track and field athlete Tobi Amusan is an expert in sprinting and the 100-meter hurdles. She holds the current world record in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 12.12 seconds set in the 2022 semi-final in Eugene, Oregon. Amusan is the reigning Commonwealth and African champion in the 100-meter hurdles. 









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


Horror Movie, by Paul Tremblay


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Swan Song, by Elin Hilderbrand






